- already at greater risk of police harassment and use of force.
- The Bill introduces Serious Violence Reduction Orders, which are likely to be used disproportionately against people of colour and could lead to an automatic custodial sentence.
- The Bill threatens to give police even more power to seize our data without our consent.

These are just a few of the things that the Bill will make into law - there's so much more to hate. If you want to be able to resist racism, campaign for effective action against climate change, fight for your rights at work or in the community, then you need to oppose this Bill.

Repressive legislation has been overturned before. The Poll Tax in the 1980s faced riots and resistance, and eventually became unworkable. Section 28, which aimed to clamp down on homosexuality being discussed in schools, was repealed in 2003 after a long fight. Public protests and pressure played a key role in these wins. The world doesn't just have to keep getting worse: we can change it.

What can you do to oppose the Police Crime Sentencing and Courts Bill?

IT'S YOUR RIGHT TO PROTEST: DON'T LET THEM TAKE IT!

This Tory government is mounting its biggest attack on our rights and freedoms in a generation. As well as continuing with the Tories' long-term agenda of cuts to public services and payouts to the rich, they are trying to

take away the right to resist. They're attacking the right to protest, reducing our ability to use the law to challenge government decisions, undermining the right of whistleblowers and journalists to criticise them, and threatening to alter the Human Rights Act - all at once!



The most important Bill the Tories have put in motion is the **Police Crime Sentencing and Courts Bill 2021**. The Bill is over 300 pages long, rushing through legislation that attacks our right to protest and our ability to go out in public without fear of police harassment.

- This Bill attacks our right to protest by allowing the police to crack down on any protest they choose simply for being "noisy" or "annoying".
- The Bill introduces draconian punishments for attending peaceful protests - up to 51 weeks in prison (compared to 3 previously) and a possible fine of £2,500 (where it was £1,000).
- The Bill increases the length and reach of other criminal sentences, with time served for children and younger people extended to three quarters of an adult sentence.
- The Bill targets Gypsy, Roma and Traveller people and homeless people for "trespass" even when they have nowhere else to go, leading to family separation and imprisonment.
- The Bill strengthens controversial police Stop and Search tactics, allowing them to Stop and Search without always needing "reasonable suspicion". This will disproportionately affect people of colour and Muslims, who are

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
